National Forests, National Parks and Bureau of Land Management Properties of the United States of America

This deed certifies that the bearer of this certificate, _____, a citizen of the United States of America, owns, in trust with 322 million other citizen-shareholders, one share in over one million square miles of national forestland, including rivers, streams, lakes, forests, grasslands, meadows, deserts and mountains. Ownership includes all contained therein, including fresh water, clean air, watersheds, minerals, plus opportunities for camping, fishing, hiking, spiritual renewal, and exploration. As co-owner of this shared inheritance, the bearer is responsible to God and all other citizens to preserve, protect, restore and cherish the above property, and is entitled to certain rights of property, including the right for the lands to be stewarded wisely in perpetuity for future generations.

Threats to your *shared* Property Rights

- transfer to states
- transfer to timber companies
- transfer to mining companies
- transfer to cattle ranches
- transfer to gas, coal and oil companies
- privatization for any reason
- leases to private corporations, companies and individuals

Actions that you can take to protect your *common and shared* citizen property rights

- Call your legislator and tell them that your property is being sold without authorization
- Tell your church and ask for a resolution or joint action
- Write the President at The White House
- Draft a petition and collect supporting signatures. Mail these to your representatives
- Write letters to the Newspaper. Defend your shared properties.
- Start a neighborhood study group on the issue, or bring it to an already functioning group
- Encourage letters from your Church to your legislator/s
- Speak out in defense of your land and the heritage of your children. If you don't who will?
